




#### What Is A Women's Centre?


A women's centre is an independent, community-based, community-led organization that provides services and programs to women and adolescent girls on a wide range of issues and crisis situations.

A women's centre is womanpositive and woman supportive.



Teens at risk


Women with few barriers but who have short-term issues for which they require support.

#### Women's Centres Approach, Core Services and Multi-Issue Entry Points



1. Women's centres use an *effective multi-dimensional approach* that ensures immediate crises are addressed, while investing in capacity building over the long term to prevent more costly, ongoing and recurring crisis intervention activities.



- 2. Women's centres are accessible, flexible, versatile and situated in local communities where core services are designed to meet women's needs.
- 3. Women's centres are not only effective, but *cost efficient* in the short and long term.





4. Women's centres work closely and cooperatively with other agencies and are an *essential link in the service network* providing quality services, high level of expertise and unique multi-issue entry points.

5. If women's centres were absent, there would be a

significant gap in services or more costly government services would be called upon to fill the gaps.

6. The investment in women's centres by the Nova Scotia government *enables tremendous opportunities for women* and their families to improve the quality of their lives.



7. With adequate, secure funding for core services, women's centres would be *uniquely situated to meet current demands for services* and programs.

# Key Challenges identified in Planning Reports

- High demand for services and programs
- Inadequate financial resources to meet current demand for services
- Severe toll on both human and financial resources due to ongoing high demand for services and inadequate financial resources.
- Need for financial support for collaborative work through our provincial association, Women's Centres Connect



Recognition that women's centres core services are distinct, essential and integral to the community network of services provided for women.

Full support and full funding for women's centres core services that enables the staff complement as defined by each Women's Centre in order to effectively deliver these core services.







Recognizing that government departments are working more cross-sectorally & recognizing the need to build and strengthen continually our collaborative efforts,

women's centres welcome the opportunity to meet with

individual departments to discuss potential collaborative efforts to strengthen services for women in our communities.



#### Future Collaborations

Recognizing that the government is encouraging collaborative efforts among community-based organizations, women's centres continue to

- develop and maintain positive, mutually beneficial, collaborative and supportive relations and referral protocols with government and other community-based agencies and initiatives
- Identify leadership in community development initiatives to advance long term solutions to local socio-economic problems
- Work closely with other services in our communities to ensure women have access to the services they need.



#### Since 2003...

Women's centres have been working collaboratively with the Department of Community Services to address key challenges and recommendations contained in planning reports.

In the 2010-2011 provincial budget, women's centres received some money to help address a long-standing need for staff salary increases.

More funding is needed, however. We continue to fall behind because there has been no increase in our operating budgets, let alone to meet the increased demand for our services.
