

Preliminary results from a large-scale National research study conducted by Centre for Addiction and Mental Health, provide independent and reliable evidence of the impact of Big Brothers Big Sisters mentors on Canada's youth. When compared with young people who have never been matched¹...

The Mentoring Effect on Education



Mentoring changes the course of young lives which, in turn, can change the future of communities by making them better places to work, live and thrive.

It can lead to a reduction in poverty and unemployment, to safer schools and neighborhoods and to a renewed optimism for growth.

The Challenge:

Youth who do not graduate from high school are at a serious disadvantage in terms of personal and economic success.

The Solution: Mentoring

Mentoring = Immediate Results

- Students who meet regularly with their mentors are **52% less likely** than their peers to skip a day of school and **37% less likely** to skip a class
- Girls are 21/2X more likely to be confident in their ability to be successful at school
- Boys are 2X more likely to believe that school is fun and that doing well academically is important

Mentoring = Safer Schools

- Girls are **4X less likely** to bully, fight, lie or lose their temper.
- Boys are 3 X less likely to suffer peer pressure related anxiety;
- Boys are **2X less likely** to develop negative conducts like bullying, fighting, lying, cheating or losing their temper.

Mentoring = Future Success

- 63% have post-secondary education
- 17% more likely to be employed
- 13% higher earnings—\$315,000 higher lifetime earnings
- 47% hold senior leadership positions

Mentoring Works.

For over one hundred years, Big Brothers Big Sisters has been making a positive difference in the lives of Canada's youth by developing and implementing a wide range of mentoring programs. Mentors teach by example the importance of giving and giving back, of staying in school and of having respect for family, peers and community.

Across Canada, Big Brothers Big Sisters has over 115 agencies supporting 300 communities across the province which serve more than **42,000** children and youth; however, there are still **thousands more Canadian children and youth** waiting for mentors.

Big Brothers Big Sisters of South Shore Our Challenges

- Finances
 - Began 2015 with a deficit
 - Bulk of deficit is from not meeting 2014 fund raising projections
 - Projecting a surplus in 2015, but will still be in a deficit situation at year end
 - Expenses are controlled, but fund raising is becoming increasingly difficult
