INTRODUCTION

The Standing Committee on Community Services, an all-party Committee of the House of Assembly, was struck at the beginning of the First Session of the Sixty-first General Assembly. Pursuant to Rule 60(2)(d) of the *Province of Nova Scotia Rules and Forms of Procedures of the House of Assembly:*

(d) the Community Services Committee is established for the purpose of considering matters normally assigned to or within the purview of the Departments and Ministers of Business and Consumer Services and of Municipal Affairs and matters relating to the Human Rights Commission and the Nova Scotia Sport and Recreation Commission.

In 1998, the Speaker, as Chairman of the Legislature's Internal Economy Board, gave the Community Services Committee written permission to also consider matters within the purview of the Department of Health and the Department of Community Services.

"That in the context of the present consideration of amendments to the Children and Family Services Act that is going on in the Department of Community Services, that the Minister of Community Services be asked to consider the proposal to define a child as a person under 19 years of age, as opposed to the present regime, 16 years of age, as this proposal had been presented here to the Standing Committee by the Children and Youth in Crisis Working Group of the Maritime Conference of the United Church."

The Honourable Denise Peterson-Rafuse, Minister of Community Services, provided the following response:

"Thank you for your correspondence of January 18, 2012, with respect to the Standing Committee's motion that consideration be given to amending the *Children and Family Services Act (CFSA)* to define a child as a person under 19 years of age.

As you know, children in care are a priority for my Department and we are always looking at ways to provide the best possible service to this vulnerable population. We are aware that improvements to existing legislation can always be made, and

that this particular piece of legislation would be no exception. However, the *CFSA* is still strong and provides protection for children.

I can share with you, that we are currently reviewing and planning for our legislative agenda for the coming years, and this *Act* is among those being considered."
