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FOREWORD & MANDATE

FOREWORD

The report of the Standing Committee on Human Resources is written in accordance with the *Province of Nova Scotia Rules and Forms of Procedure of the House of Assembly*. First, outlining the role of the Committee with respect to approving or not approving applications to provincial Agencies, Boards and Commissions. Second, providing a brief summary of witnesses and topics that came before the Committee as assigned under the Committee's mandate.

MANDATE

Functions of Standing Committees

- 60(2)(c) the Human Resources Committee is established for the purpose of
- (i) considering matters normally assigned to or within the purview of the Departments and Ministers of Education and Culture and of Labour,
- (ii) reviewing and approving or not approving candidates for appointment to agencies, boards or commissions where the Governor in Council has, pursuant to an enactment, the sole discretion to make the appointment or where the Governor in Council makes the appointment by choosing from a list of nominees provided to the Governor in Council pursuant to an enactment,
- (iii) reviewing and approving or not approving ministerial appointees to agencies, boards or commissions where, pursuant to an enactment, Governor in Council approval is not required, and
- (iv) for purposes of greater clarity and certainty, the Committee shall be guided by the terms of reference set out herein and which form part of this Rule;

TERMS OF REFERENCE

Terms of Reference in Reviewing Agency, Board and Commission Appointments:

- 1. Where Governor in Council approval is required for an appointment to an Agency, Board or Commission, after consideration by Executive Council of a person recommended for appointment to an Agency, Board or Commission, the Clerk of the Executive Council shall submit the name of the person to the Human Resources Committee, on Form "A".
- 2. Prior to making a Ministerial appointment to an Agency, Board or Commission for which Governor in Council approval is not required, a Minister shall submit the name of the

- proposed appointee to the Executive Council for consideration. Where the Executive Council recommends the name, the Clerk of the Executive Council shall submit the name of the person to the Human Resources Committee.
- 3. Committee members shall review the name submitted for approval having regard to qualifications of the individual, affirmative action concerns and, where relevant, the regional representativeness of the Agency, Board or Commission.
- 4. The purpose of the Committee review is not to replace the function of Government Departments and Ministers in making appointments. Its function is to approve or not approve the name before it, not to consider or recommend alternative names for appointments.
- 5. The following appointments shall not be submitted to the Human Resources Committee for review:
 - (a) appointments of provincial public or civil servants by virtue of their employment (i.e. the Deputy Minister of Finance is an unpaid member of the Lotteries Commission);
 - (b) candidates selected by an open competition and selection process or peer review (i.e. Provincial Judges selected by the Judicial Appointments Committee or employees of Agencies, Boards or Commissions);
 - (c) candidates recommended for appointment to self-regulatory bodies who are elected or recommended by the body (i.e. Nova Scotia Medical Society);
 - (d) candidates recommended for appointment to Hospitals and Universities where the candidate is recommended by the Board of Governors or Directors of the Institution.
- 6. The Committee may interview a recommended candidate where a majority of members support a motion to interview a particular recommended candidate.
- 7. The Committee shall not hear submissions or representations from anyone not a member of the Committee.
- 8. Meetings of the Committee shall be open to the public unless the Committee by majority vote determines to meet *in camera*.
- 9. The Committee shall meet at least once a month every month of the year irrespective of whether the House of Assembly has been prorogued.
- 10. The Committee shall approve or not approve recommended candidates on the basis of a simple majority.

- 11. The Committee shall make recommendations with respect to every name submitted by Executive Council on the day it appears on the agenda unless a majority of members agree to defer a recommendation to the next meeting.
- 12. Recommendations of the Committee shall be accepted by the Executive Council and the Minister responsible for the appointment.
- 13. The agenda for meetings and a list of recommended candidates and Form "A" will be provided to all members one week in advance.

INTRODUCTION

The Standing Committee on Human Resources, an all-party Committee of the House of Assembly, was struck at the beginning of the First Session of the Sixty-Second General Assembly, pursuant to Rule 60(2)(c) of the *Province of Nova Scotia Rules and Forms of Procedure of the House of Assembly*.

PROCEDURES AND OPERATIONS

The Human Resources Committee meets on the last Tuesday of every month in the Legislative Committees Office.

AGENCIES, BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS PROCESS

During the First Session of the Fifty-Sixth General Assembly (1993), an amendment was made to Rule 60 of the *Province of Nova Scotia Rules and Forms of Procedure of the House of Assembly*. This amendment increased the mandate of the Standing Committee on Human Resources. The Committee has been assigned responsibility to review potential appointments to nearly all government Agencies, Boards and Commissions (ABCs).

Appointment Process

There are two ways in which an appointment can be made to an Agency, Board or Commission. They are as follows:

i. Order in Council

Order in Council appointments require both the Executive Council (Cabinet) and the Lieutenant Governor's approval.

ii. Ministerial

Ministerial appointments are made by the Minister responsible for the Agency, Board or Commission. The appointments are forwarded to the Executive Council (Cabinet) for review.

Since 1993, the Human Resources Committee has been assigned responsibility to review both forms of appointments. The only appointments that the Committee will not consider are those excluded by Rule 60(2)(c)(iv)5(a-d) of the mandate contained within the *Province of Nova Scotia Rules and Forms of Procedure of the House of Assembly*.

Agencies, Boards and Commissions come in different forms, ranging from advisory bodies to arms-length Crown corporations, and have different roles, mandates, authorities and jurisdictions.

Number of Agencies, Boards and Commissions

Currently there are 158 active Agencies, Boards and Commissions. There are approximately 780 people currently appointed to ABCs.

Remuneration

The remuneration for Agencies, Boards and Commissions' members varies among different boards. For example, the Public Accountants Board pays \$500 per meeting plus travelling expenses; the Shubenacadie Canal Commission compensates for expenses only.

Bulk Advertisement

Once every six months a list of upcoming vacancies for all government Agencies, Boards and Commissions is generated. These vacancies are advertised through Communications Nova Scotia according to the Standing Committee on Human Resources' advertising policy (July 23, 1998). In addition, the departments can place ads for individual ABCs when required.

DEPARTMENTAL SCREENING PANELS

Once the individual applications are forwarded to the department, the screening panels are consulted. All appointments, even those people being reappointed to a board, must go through the screening panel process. Screening panels are appointed by the individual Ministers to screen all applicants to ABCs to ensure that all candidates are chosen in a fair and equitable manner.

The screening panels are to be made up of volunteers from the community. The members of the screening panels need to have technical expertise, they should represent the stakeholders of those particular ABCs which they oversee and there should be some regional representation within the panel, where appropriate.

The mandate of the Screening Panels, as established by the Executive Council, is as follows:

Screening Panels

Screening panels were established as a matter of discretion. The purpose of screening panels was to establish a mechanism to determine qualified candidates for appointment to ABCs to assist Ministers in the selection of candidates to fill vacancies on ABCs.

Screening panel members are selected by Ministers on the basis of experience in the area of concern to the department, having regard for expertise, regional representation, gender, racial and other affirmative action considerations. Departmental staff assist the Minister in recruiting screening panel members.

Once the screening panel has approved a candidate, his/her application is entered into a pool of candidates from which the Minister may select applicants for appointment. The signed paperwork is then forwarded to the Clerk of the Executive Council. The applications are sent to Cabinet prior to being sent to the Standing Committee on Human Resources.

Once Cabinet approval is obtained, those applications that the Human Resources Committee is mandated to approve or not approve are sent to the Legislative Committees Office and placed on the Standing Committee on Human Resources' agenda.

The material is received no later than the Friday, eleven calendar days prior to the scheduled Human Resources Committee meeting. The material is distributed to all Committee members on the Tuesday, one week in advance of the meeting, as dictated by the *Province of Nova Scotia Rules and Forms of Procedure of the House of Assembly*.

If the appointments are approved, the material is returned to the Executive Council Office. If the appointments are not approved, the material is also returned to the Executive Council Office, whereupon it will be returned to the appropriate department with a letter explaining the circumstances surrounding the rejection.

OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH AND SAFETY & AGENDA SETTING

October 28, 2014

MATTERS OF DISCUSSION

Representatives from the Department of Labour and Advanced Education appeared before the committee to provide an overview of the Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) division. The Department of Labour and Advanced Education works to promote and coordinate workplace safety, support workplace parties, and intervene when safety conditions are not met. The workplace safety branch was re-organized in March, creating 17 new positions. Five of these positions are new inspectors and the remaining positions were added to the education teams and outreach units. There are a total of 82 positions in OHS. The OHS 1-800 number receives 2,500 calls a year, with each complaint investigated by an OHS inspector.

COMMITTEE BUSINESS

The committee reviewed appointments to Agencies, Boards and Commissions.

The appointments to the Invest Nova Scotia board were not received by the committee by the one week deadline as required, therefore, the appointments to the board were stood. The committee discussed holding an extra meeting in order to approve appointments to the Invest Nova Scotia board.

- Move that the committee meet Thursday, November 6th at 10:00am to appoint candidates to the Invest Nova Scotia Board.
 - Motion carried.

During discussion of the appointments to the Gaelic College Foundation Board it was inquired as to why no Gaelic speaking individuals have been appointed to the board. The appointments to the board were approved and the committee agreed that a letter will be sent to the Executive Council Office regarding appointment requirements.

An agenda setting session was held and the FOIPOP Review Officer was brought forward as a potential witness. A motion was introduced:

- To not accept the FOIPOP Review Officer.
 - Motion carried.

A motion was introduced to invite the following:

 - Motion carried.

There was deliberation among the committee and legal counsel as to what the proper procedure and process is to approving members to Agencies, Boards and Commissions. It was agreed by the committee that the clerk of the committee would look into the question and provide information on the correct procedure.

Discussion was held surrounding how, at the agenda setting meeting on October 28th, the topic of bringing the FOIPOP Review Officer in as a witness was voted against. It was noted that the Premier and the Minister of Internal Services stated in the House of Assembly that the topic should be brought back to committee. A motion was introduced:

- Move that the FOIPOP officer come in for the February meeting.
 - Motion carried

The committee received correspondence from a Ms. Deborah MacKenzie regarding a request to appear. The request was initially brought up in the House as a petition. As the committee does

not typically look at individual cases it was agreed that the Chair would speak with Ms. MacKenzie to get more details and determine what department would be best suited to assist with the request.

NOVA SCOTIA APPRENTICESHIP AGENCY

November 25, 2014

MATTERS OF DISCUSSION

Representatives from the Nova Scotia Apprenticeship Agency provided an overview of the work that is done. The Nova Scotia Apprenticeship Agency is a new agency that was established July 1st, 2014 after three years of consultation, and falls under the Apprenticeship and Trades Qualifications Act and the Community Colleges Act. The agency is comprised of the Apprenticeship Board, trade advisory committees, agency staff and the CEO. There are fifteen seats on the new board. Ten seats are reserved for members of the trades across four sectors, and five members at large.

National studies show that only 25% of employees who could hire apprentices actually do. All apprenticeship requirements are set by the industry and it is industry who determine the number of work hours required, the technical skills needed and training for each apprentice. The main focus of the agency is to support the relationship between an employer and an apprentice. Effective October 2014, the agency introduced a START program focusing on small to medium sized enterprises and to help apprentices from underrepresented groups. The START program provides financial support and incentives to employers who hire an apprentice. There are currently 270 active START agreements, with 13 – 15 agreements pending.

COMMITTEE BUSINESS

The committee reviewed appointments to Agencies, Boards and Commissions.

The committee clerk provided clarification regarding the procedure of approving appointments to agency, board and commissions and the chair outlined the steps involved in an appointment process to the members. It was noted that the names of the nominees to the Invest Nova Scotia board which had been brought up in the House of Assembly, prior to approval by the committee, were introduced as "proposed members". Therefore, the appointments were not confirmed before the committee provided approval.

The following correspondence was received by the committee:

- Correspondence from the Department of Labour and Advanced Education providing information requested at the October 28th meeting.
- Correspondence from the Executive Council Office responding to a letter requesting information at the October 28th meeting.

The committee discussed the request to appear from Ms. Deborah MacKenzie. The chair looked further into the matter and it was determined that the office of the Minister of Health and Wellness would oversee the issue. It was agreed that the request to appear would be deferred until the committee heard back from the Minister of Health and Wellness.

It was agreed that the committee would meet from 10:00am – 12:00pm for the months of December, January and February.

BENEFITS FOR FIREFIGHTERS

December 16, 2014

WITNESSES

MATTERS OF DISCUSSION

Representatives from the Department of Labour and Advanced Education provided an overview of benefits for firefighters. There are currently 7,000 firefighters in Nova Scotia; 6,300 volunteer and 700 career. Both career and volunteer firefighters are eligible for benefits, and all firefighters are entitled to the same benefits as other Worker's Compensation Board (WCB) subscribers, plus presumptive benefits. All firefighters are employed by a municipality, and it is the decision of the employer to either subscribe to private benefits or to subscribe to the WCB. Many employers will offer private benefits over WCB as private insurance offers better short term benefits, whereas WCB provides stronger long term benefits.

Presumptive benefits were introduced in 2003 through the Firefighter' Compensation Act. Under presumptive benefits a firefighter does not have to show a connection between an injury/illness and the workplace. Six types of cancers are included under presumptive benefits: brain, bladder, kidney, non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, leukemia and colon.

FREEDOM OF INFORMATION AND PROTECTION OF PRIVACY REVIEW OFFICE OVERVIEW

February 24, 2015

WITNESSES

MATTERS OF DISCUSSION

Representatives from the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Review Office (FOIPOP) provided an overview of the office and its operation.

The FOIPOP Review office was created in 1994 with privacy responsibilities added in 2009, and health privacy added in 2013. The current office has 5 staff members; a Director of Investigation and Mediation, 3 Investigators and an Intake manager. The Review Officer has oversight over 400 provincial and municipal public bodies under FOIPOP and the Municipal Government Act, and 26,000 health custodians and agents under the Personal Health Information Act. The Privacy Review Officer Act and the Personal Health Information Act are the other two governing statutes of the FOIPOP Office.

Responsibilities of the Review Officer include:

- Hear and decide requests for review of decisions relating to access request made by all provincial and municipal public bodies and health care custodians.
- Hear and decide privacy complaints against public bodies and health care custodians.
- Monitor privacy provisions (not municipalities)
- Initiate privacy investigations (not municipalities)
- o Provide advice on privacy to public bodies and health custodians
- Monitor breaches and disclosures for health care research purposes.

COMMITTEE BUSINESS

The committee reviewed appointments to Agencies, Boards and Commissions.

The committee was informed that the Chair had received a request from the Executive Council Office, on behalf of the Department of Health and Wellness, to withdraw from consideration the appointments to the Provincial Health Authority Board that had been previously forwarded. It was indicated that the Department preferred to appoint all board members at one time. A motion was introduced:

- That the committee receive information on all 59 applicants for the Provincial Health Authority board.
 - Motion defeated

It was discussed that the committee hold a special meeting in order to approve members to the Provincial Health Authority board ahead of the board becoming active. A motion was introduced:

- That the committee give the chairman the authority to call a special meeting, at the discretion of the chairman, to deal with reviewing the appointments to the Provincial Health Authority Board.
 - Motion carried

SchoolsPlus is voluntary and extends services to those who need to increase school engagement, have exhausted usual interventions, need to be connected with services for support and are involved with various agencies and need to bridge the gap. Each site has a regional advisory committee comprised of representation from various government departments such as Justice, Community Services, Education and Health and Wellness. This allows for easier collaboration amongst professionals to better serve youth and families.

SchoolsPlus was a result of Commissioner Nunn's recommendation for the need for improved coordination and collaboration in the delivery of programs and services for children and youth. The program started as a pilot project in the Fall of 2008 with 14 schools and is now in more than 150 schools across the province, with plans to expand to 180 schools by the end of the year.

COMMITTEE BUSINESS

The committee reviewed appointments to Agencies, Boards and Commissions.

Representatives from the Collaborative Partnership Network provided an overview of the organization.

The Collaborative Partnership Network (CPN) is a network of nine equitable disability employment agencies across Nova Scotia dedicated to assisting individuals with barriers to the labour market find and maintain employment. The CPN was formed in 2001 and incorporated in 2006.

Approximately 1000 jobs are created through CPN each year, with 50% of CPN clients finding meaningful work. For each year that the CPN agencies provide services, an estimated \$20million is returned to the economy by way of employment success, while simultaneously saving approximately \$10million on government programming. A client who finds employment through CPN earn almost double what they would have received through government programs.

COMMITTEE BUSINESS

The committee reviewed appointments to Agencies, Boards and Commissions.

The committee discussed the motion that was deferred from the May 26th meeting:
